National Tournament Managers Report:

Well, another year has rolled on by, where there have been a number highs and some lows within our sport in the past 12 months.

Some of these have included an international bronze medal at the World Youth Championships in Korea, in the Singles event for Ben Pettit. At the same tournament a perfect game of 300 bowled was by Jessica Marginson, becoming only 8th woman to do so. Our Junior, Youth & Senior teams are continuing to dominate and win their respective teams tournaments in Australia. The TBNZ50 Seniors also performing well at the Asian Zone Championships in Singapore, were just some of the highlights on the international stage. There were a multitude of honour awards achieved over the past 12 months, with 22 awards in all. I mean, even I managed to bag a couple of them.

Whilst we are experiencing a growth in numbers at our TBNZ tournaments, as the recent Senior Nationals showed by topping over a 100 entries. However, we are seeing a decline in the number of centres with the ability to host these tournaments,. This may be partly to do with this growth or is time for some format changes to find a balance between what is best for the host centres, the athletes, as well as time & costs. As a sport we want to see these national tournaments rotated to as many places as possible.

Is it a case of, are we fast becoming an aging sport? As there is an ever increasing in numbers each year entering into the Senior & Grand Senior divisions. Whilst, there is growth in numbers within the Junior grade, with some centres investing time into having a succession plan for the future. The concerning issue is the stagnant numbers of ages 30-45 year olds not participating in our national events. Is it just simply a time, cost, family or work commitments that prohibit these bowlers the ability to enter? I ask you what is the solution moving forward? Is it format changes, scheduling or something else?
